



Philosophers have long considered three subjects of contemplation to be paramount: the True, the Good, and the Beautiful—called the Transcendentals. All three of these are considered by many people today purely relativistic concepts, and one of the goals of the Catholic educator must be to contradict the prevailing relativism. Of the three, beauty is often thought to be the most subjective, for "beauty is in the eye of the beholder." There is some truth to this old saying, but it is not the whole truth. Great thinkers have over the ages argued that beautiful creations have some characteristics in common. Advocates of literary art have further maintained that beautiful writings are effective in moving our hearts to follow the truth and to do what is good. We should find profound hope, in the fact, that the imagination can capture great truths of the human heart and move us to live virtuously.

Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time February 9, 2025

Sunday Mass

In a reflection for Mass last Wednesday, it was written "There is bitterness, and then there is something worse than bitterness, that is, a 'bitter root.' A bitter root springs up and produces such evils as hatred, racism, unforgiveness, resentment, deception, violence, and cruelty. Because a bitter root is so productive of destructive actions. This in turn can contribute to people choosing to fall "away from the grace of God."

We know that all Christian denominations encourage members to attend faithfully every week. As far as I know, we are the only one that carries it a step further to say it is a sin to deliberately skip Sunday Mass. But in our modern society, many choose not to attend and don't see anything wrong with it. Our Catholic Church's insistence is very old. It dates back century after century to the very early days of Christianity. St. Ignatius of Antioch wrote in a letter to the Ephesians, "Try to gather together more frequently to give thanks to God and to praise Him. For when you come together frequently, Satan's powers are undermined, and the destruction that he threatens is done away with in the unanimity of your faith. Nothing is better than peace, in which all warfare between heaven and earth is brought to an end."

This assumes of course that we have developed a perfect faith and love toward Jesus Christ. Showing up bored, or wishing this will get over quickly so I can get to what I really want, or doing this just to keep Mom and Dad (or whoever) off my back is not helpful and in fact, will produce the opposite effect. We need faith and love in our relationship with God. When these two are found together, there is God and everything else concerning right living follows from them. No one professing faith sins for it is a rebellion against God. No one possessing love hates. A tree is known by its fruit. So those who belong to Christ will be known by what they do. For the work we are about is not a matter of words here and now, but depends on the power of faith and on being faithful to the very end. It is better to remain silent and to be in good conscience than to speak but not to be. Teaching is good if the speaker also acts on it.

Now there was one teacher who "spoke and it was made." Even what He did in silence is worthy of the Father. He who has the word of Jesus can truly listen also to his silence so that he may act through his speech and be known by his silence. Nothing is hidden from the Lord. Even our secrets are clearly known by Jesus!

Our Lord received anointing on his head at his baptism in order to breathe incorruptibility into the Church. Do not be anointed with the evil order of the teachings of the prince of this world, that he may not lead you captive away from the life that is set before you by the Church. Why do some fail? It is because they see the teachings of Jesus as a stumbling block instead of as salvation and life.
