Prayer

Prayer is something that we acknowledge is very important yet at the same time, far too often, we relegate it to the bottom of our list rather than at the top. A sunny day, warm air, clean water, beautiful plants, and the ability to make sounds that are musical and pleasing are but a few of the many gifts God gives to us. Other gifts come from God as well. The ability to build things, to sell items, and to create wealth comes from God.

Somehow, all this and more escaped from us. We took them for granted. Even worse we began to battle with others to hoard more and more items for ourselves. Finally, God our loving Father sent his Son, Jesus Christ into this world. He came to reveal to us God's love and to show us how to live.

This is what our faith is all about. It reveals his love and the creation of the world. We learn how to love God. Having loved him and following Jesus, we are then welcomed into eternal life. This is our only way into eternal life. To reject Jesus and his teaching is to reject God and therefore eternal life.

Do you want to live longer? Do you want more than the decades of life here on earth? Do you wish to live forever? Then we must embrace Jesus. To love Jesus means we then follow his teachings on life. This means we will obey his commandments and learn to love him as he has and continues to love us. Learning to love Jesus means we pray. But what is prayer? How do we pray?

St. John Damascene taught, "Prayer is the raising of one's mind and heart to God or the requesting of good things from God." St. Therese of Lisieux said, "For me, prayer is a surge of the heart; it is a simple look turned toward heaven, it is a cry of recognition and of love, embracing both trial and joy."

"Teach us to pray!" the disciples of Jesus asked. And He taught them how to pray. Learning to pray will be our topic in the coming weeks. It is important. It is the desire of our hearts.
